Objective: Refine spoken precision without idioms; master natural stress & intonation; communicate

clearly in diplomacy

Outcome: More precise, confident speech; strong listening and vocabulary recall for international

meetings & briefings

1. Profile / Background

Age / Nationality: 44, Estonian

Current Level of English: Advanced (C1)

Previous Learning Experience: Extensive formal study and independent learning; demonstrates

near-native reading comprehension.

Occupation / Area of Study: Civil servant, working internationally.

2. Specific Needs and Objectives

Language Skills Focus:

- Precision in vocabulary choice and sentence structure.
- Development of natural stress and intonation patterns in spoken English.
- Refining fluency in professional communication while avoiding idiomatic expressions.

Reasons for Learning English:

- To communicate with clarity and precision in international professional contexts.
- To ensure diplomatic and formal communication remains effective and unambiguous.

Short-Term Objectives:

- Expand and refine vocabulary to achieve maximum precision in speech and writing.
- Improve spoken fluency with a focus on word stress, rhythm, and intonation.
- Strengthen the ability to engage in high-level discussions on abstract and professional topics.

Long-Term Goals:

- Achieve full confidence in professional spoken English at a near-native level.
- Use English with accuracy and nuance to represent his role in international forums and negotiations.

3. Method

Tutors' Approach:

- Initial needs analysis revealed strong receptive skills but a desire for greater spoken precision.
- Focus placed on advanced expression without idiomatic usage at the learner's request.

Instructional Strategy:

- Deep work on accuracy and precision through discussion of complex intellectual topics.
- Integration of authentic listening practice high-level news bulletins, policy podcasts, and international affairs reports - with tasks to identify gist and extract specific professional vocabulary.
- Pronunciation and prosody training focused on word stress and natural intonation.

Materials and Resources Used:

- News broadcasts and international relations podcasts for targeted listening and vocabulary work.
- Authentic articles on AI ethics, global politics, and historical developments.
- Vocabulary-building tasks exploring synonyms and precise adjective choice.
- Recorded speech analysis for self-correction of intonation and rhythm.

4. Content

Examples of Content Used in Lessons:

- Detailed analysis of current-affairs podcasts and policy briefings.
- Listening tasks: taking notes on gist, identifying specific terms or legal/political references.
- Discussions on motivation, AI, international governance, and European history.
- Structured speech practice focusing on clarity and precision.

Skills Developed:

- Greater skill in **active listening** grasping both overall message and technical wording from authentic audio.
- Enhanced ability to select exact vocabulary to convey complex ideas without idiomatic phrasing.
- Improved speech rhythm and natural intonation.

Specific Exercises or Activities:

- Listen \rightarrow summarise \rightarrow refine vocabulary based on authentic political and policy content.
- Guided discussions with real-time feedback on adjective choice and sentence structure.
- Spoken summaries of podcasts and news reports with targeted pronunciation coaching.

5. Progress

Challenges Faced:

- Shifting from passive comprehension to active vocabulary retrieval during complex listening.
- Adjusting prosody and stress to sound more fluent and less overly formal.

Highlights / Key Achievements:

- Significantly better at extracting key terms and details from complex English audio.
- More precise spoken expression with advanced vocabulary replacing simpler terms.
- Improved confidence and natural rhythm when presenting professional ideas.

6. Outcome

Immediate Applications:

- More effective participation in international meetings and policy briefings after listening to complex English input.
- Clear, idiom-free but sophisticated spoken English for diplomatic contexts.

Long-Term Use:

- Continued work with authentic listening to sustain precision and near-native fluency.
- Greater agility in responding spontaneously and clearly in international professional settings.
